PASTOR'S MOMENT

What is Lent? Many of us in the Protestant Christian tradition and particularly the Disciples of Christ church are somewhat unfamiliar with the season of Lent.



We tend to get a lot of our ideas about it from popular depictions and ingrained images of penitent fasting and selfdenial, the purpose of which often seems ill-defined. I want to take a little space this month to share some information about Lent; what it is (and isn't), how to participate faithfully, where it came from, what it means for us as believers and what purpose it has in the Christian year.

/ What is Lent? Lent is the 40-day period of repentance and renewal preceding Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday and

concludes in celebration on Easter morning. The last week of Lent, called Holy Week, commemorated the last week of Jesus' life on Earth and is the final, most important part of Lent. Lent is a special time of the Christian year devoted to meditation, prayer, penitential practices, reflecting on Christ's sacrifice and resurrection, renewal of baptism vows and recommitment to the Christian life. It is deeply personal and completely voluntary if and how you choose to observe the season of Lent.

What is Lent not? Lent is not simply a season of required fasting or an excuse to give up something in order to achieve some sense of increased holiness or satisfy a religious requirement.

How can I participate?

- Penitential practice fasting from something in order to use that time and energy to devote to prayer and increasing relationship with God,
- Repentance reflecting on personal inadequacies, sin in our lives, personal wrongdoings and faults and how we might overcome them, seeking help from God and even other people to help us, recalling our baptismal commitments in order to reaffirm our faith and renew our spirits.
- Resolution Remembering Christ's sacrifice was for us, that we might be reconciled to God, that we might have life everlasting, encouraging us to pursue more Christ-like habits and attitudes
- Participation– Ash Wednesday services, Lenten devotionals (on the church entry table), Bible study, Palm Sunday processional, Maundy Thursday service, devoting yourself to the traditional Lenten practices of good deeds, increased giving, prayer, scripture study, etc.

What is the biblical foundation of Lent? The season is based in the 40 days of fasting and praying exemplified in scripture by Moses (Exodus 34:27-28), Elijah (1 Kings 19:1-18), and especially Jesus (Matthew 4:1-2)

All told, Lent, like all seasons of the church year with all their practices and remembrances, is a time for Christians to reflect and remember, to seek God and God's guidance for their lives, and to repent and resolve to grow closer to God and increase in faith and service. If you are still curious about Lent and want to know more, just ask me. I even have a pamphlet I can give you that lays out the basics, and yes, it is purple. ;)

♦ Thanks to Troy Costales who fixed the sink drain in the primary room last week.




MEN'S GROUP

RECYCLING—BOTTLES, CANS, INK. TONER





On our last service night, January 29th we served 134 families. The demand remains high. The year-end total for clients/ families served was 8004, the number of pounds distributed was 613,124 and volunteer hours were 4846. Astounding numbers!

It's been several years since we have honored our volunteers so this Saturday the 24th there is a luncheon to do just that. It will be from 12-2 p.m. at the Keizer Elks. I am looking forward to a good turnout from our KCC group. We are awesome!

KCC Indoor Park was created provide an indoor play facility for parents and caregivers and their pre-Kindergarten age children where they can practice large motor skills and socialization.

We were excited to re-open Indoor Park in Spring of 2023 and are enjoying seeing families use our space. The format has changed since COVID-19 so please click <u>HERE</u> to be directed to our page for more information.

Available by appointment only. You can reserve by emailing or calling the office.

The fee is \$5 per group, per day for use of KCC toys and cleaning supplies. Play time for your group is between 9 am and noon on the reserved day with up to ½ hour afterwards allotted for cleanup. Each group must clean and sanitize all toys, equipment, and tables used during their play time.



WEEK OF COMPASSION


